



The Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations (FAO) has reported that, in 2022, 80% to 100% of **Malawi** did not have enough food to feed its population and that **Zambia's** food insecurity figure was also high at 60%-80%. In spite of years of aid these sub-saharan countries continue to struggle to produce enough food for their people.

In Malawi and Zambia our food security program has developed over 20 years and we have learnt many lessons which have led to changes in the program and better outcomes. Sustainability is key to the training of farmers, environmentally friendly methods are taught and we stay in an area for 3 years or more for continuity of the benefits. Income generation skills are taught in small groups and loans given so that farmers (men and women) can commence small businesses. For example, in Malawi groups were established to teach skills in -

*sewing

*pig breeding

*mushroom cultivation

*baking

*soap making

*bee keeping

As a result 92% of families increased their average income and 73 village shops were established.


In order to improve the health of the community, 2,948 people now have access to clean water due to the building and restoring of 36 water wells, 300 toilets have been provided and 1,265 people trained in sanitation and hygiene, particularly through the Covid crisis.

10 households received farm inputs such as bags of seed, fertiliser and equipment for the development of 10 demonstration plots where 108 training sessions in good agriculture practices were conducted resulting to 248 households (83%) becoming food secure in 3 staple crops, eating 3 meals and 6 food groups per day. As a result there was a 95% drop in malnutrition cases.

An evaluation at the close of the year showed that many women in Malawi, due to the death of their husbands from Malaria and Aids, are more vulnerable than male-headed houses and that economic inequalities existed between these two groups. As a result Malawi EHC has decided to place emphasis on the training of women in the year ahead.

Water & Sanitation Community Development



The Pass-On Program Community Development



One of the most effective strategies for the sustainability of this project is the Pass-On program where a farmer receives two goats or pigs or chickens, breeds them and passes on 3 of the offspring to another farmer who agrees to do the same. The graph below shows the progress in this program in Zambia over 4 years with no ongoing costs.

India Community Development

It has now been 17 years since the Love Annupampattu primary school was built to provide free English-medium education for 200 children from a nearby low-caste village in the south of India. In the beginning the children were malnourished with no English and little future for a life any different than that of their parents. As you can see from the photo below, life has changed!!

The children are happy, well-fed and looking forward to a brighter future where their options for life have been increased because of their education in English. Currently there are still 180 children in the school, 86 boys and 94 girls, an important milestone in a village where the education of girls was not a priority.

Each month 3,361 meals are cooked for the children and the 12 staff and the school bus travels 943 km to transport children to and from the school. This all makes a difference to the continuation of the school program and the well-being of the children.

The of this aim community development program was not just to educate children but to determine how to help this whole village to lift itself out of poverty.

As we surveyed the village it was discovered that many of the women (often the mothers) had no skills that could help to generate income and so the cycle of poverty was perpetuated.

A teacher was hired and a room set up within the school with treadle sewing machines and materials and the first vocational training classes in sewing and embroidery commenced. The teacher who commenced these classes is still teaching them today,

Now, some 17 years later, more than 300 women have been trained in groups of 10 over 6 month periods, enabling them to find paid work or set up their own small sewing business. Many have saved half the cost of a sewing machine and we have provided them with the remaining 50%.



Bangladesh Community Development

Partnership with Bangladesh



In this last year Covid restrictions forced all schools to close down until March 22 and the teachers visited homes to make sure learning continued. All 897 children in the four Bangladesh schools graduated to the next class and received a new school uniform, a new school bag, new educational books and school materials and food parcels to help with shortages caused by the Coronavirus. It's not always easy to get these children in Bangladesh to smile, but you can see by these photos how delighted they are.

Food parcels delivered to school families have become a common feature of school life in the Bangladesh EHC schools as the Coronavirus continues to wreak havoc on the lives of the poor.

As in India, women in Bangladesh are often unskilled and have no way to help their husbands to provide for their families. After completing their sewing training they are given a certificate of completion and can then earn an income by starting a cottage business wth their new machine. Over the last 12 months, in spite of the difficulties caused by the Coronavirus, 45 women were able to complete the training and receive their certificate, bringing much joy into a life with little joy.

The women who received their certificates and new machines want to express their gratitude and thanks for all you have made possible in the life of their family.

Due to the strict Covid lockdown some of the distribution of rickshaws and sewing machines were delayed. However, in November, 21 Vans and Rickshaws were able to be distributed, giving the "pullers" a new lease of life as they could then more readily earn an income.

Most of the men who received a van or rickshaw are very poor and can only earn money day by day. They have no excess funds to buy a van and have to rent one at exorbitant prices. Now, with no rent to pay, all profit goes to provide for their families.

Ethiopian Prison Ministry



BRINGING HOPE TO THE HOPELESS

In spite of Covid-19 and the continuing war in the north of Ethiopia, **Ethiopia Prison Ministry** continues to bring hope in 19 of the prisons in Ethiopia ... teaching survival skills to the men and women who are imprisoned and providing an education to the children of the prisoners who are incarcerated with their parents.

Each December, Setatow Befekadu (Set), the founder of the organisation, travels to Ethiopia to visit the prisons and purchase the materials and equipment needed by each prison. During the year there is a staff person who continues with the ministry and monitoring and reports back to Set.

Each prison is different with their own skills training according to the particular needs of the prison community so that these men and women are equipped to earn a living when they leave the prison.

Some of the skills taught are -

- * welding
- *brick-making
- * tailoring
- *weaving
- *baking
- *hairdressing
- *make-up & skin-care

Prisoners are also educated in many areas such as the prevention of crime, reconciliation, the prevention of AIDS and drug use and are provided with sports equipment to help keep them fit while they are in prison.

Wherever possible the children are educated by a local teacher who comes to the prison and in some cases, through

the generosity of supporters, a one-room school has been built within the prison.














Amidst the cacophony of rockets piercing the air and shattering homes, whole families fled war-torn regions in Ukraine. Families spent weeks in shelters without food, electricity, running water or heat, surrounded by the cries of hungry children and coughs brought on by the cold. Finally, after waiting amid the rumble of miles of cars to cross the Ukraine border, they arrived at refugee centres set up in churches, homes, halls and even in subway stations. Every Home Gobal Concern helped to provide comfort, food, clothes and essentials for some of these devastated families.

Funds sent from Australia and New Zealand were used in Ukraine, Bulgaria and Romania.

BUSES IN UKRAINE - Funds were used to hire and fuel buses, each loaded with 3 tons of food and other supplies, which travelled throughout the country to places with great need. The staff would unload the buses to provide for people and thern load the buses with people who were trying to flee the area and take them out of Ukraine. Then the process would be repeated over and over and over.

At least 2,000 people received humanitarian aid in this way.

Funds were also used to buy food to fill plastic bags which held up to 10 kg of food. The bags were loaded into many cargo vans and delivered to war zones where people were struggling to obtain food – many hiding out in basements.

In this project, over 240,000 people received humanitarian aid.

ROMANIA & BULGARIA - Many countries in Eastern Europe saw a large influx of Ukrainian refugees fleeing to find safety. Our EHC partners in Romania and Bulgaria were able to utilise funds to serve the refugees in their countries. In **Bulgaria**, they were able to provide humanitarian aid to **1,000** refugees - food, clothes, hygiene products and accommodation for sleeping. In **Romania**, they were able to provide humanitarian aid to **450** refugees. They were given packages with food and hygiene products, clothing and underwear and housing for refugees who needed to stay longer.

As families were separated and millions suddenly found themselves unmoored from their old lives, a kind face, a smile, a hug and a prayer gave simple assurance to these familes that they were not alone. This has been a precious gift!



Evaluation:

Evaluations are an important part of the overseas program of Every Home Global Concern so that we can learn lessons from the field for future planning. Evaluations can take place during monitoring, at the half-way point of a project or after a project finishes to determine what was effective and what lessons could be learned for future planning.

In 2022, at the close of the project year, an **independent evaluation of the Food Security program in Zambia** took place with the main objective being to assess whether it had achieved its annual targets and objectives and to derive lessons learned during implementation. This evaluation objectively measured the levels of sustainability, the technology practices used and whether income had improved to determine what change had taken place in people's lives. This was gained through in-depth interviews with ten lead farmers, fifty of the farmers and five other people benefitting from the program as well as a review of monthly progress and financial reports.

The evaluation found that the project continued to be relevant to the community, was effective in enhancing the lives of 600 farmers and their families and was efficient both in terms of value for money and in long-term assistance. This was evident from interviewing project beneficiaries, most of whom were able to clearly articulate the improved farming technology, good health and sanitation practices and business acumen passed onto them from the trainers. Sustainability was a key factor observed in the evaluation as the knowledge and skills acquired by the Lead Farmers and village project committee will continue to be used to further promote improved farming technology theyond the lifespan of the project.

One of the challenges faced was the restriction on movement and gatherings due to Covid 19 so some of the targets were not met.

One of the lessons learned was that conservation agriculture technology had proven to be a cheaper practice to improve crop yield for 156 households in the last two years and this had encouraged other farmers, outside of the project, to also use these practices to improve their crops.
